






Why are we here?

The Landscape

What are triggers?

Simple Definition

A stimulus that elicits a reaction

Source: American Psychological Association Dictionary

In-depth Definition

A system where a minor event causes a major physical reaction, but the two events are generally unrelated in nature

Characteristics of Triggers



Mind & Body

Can be emotional and/or physical



Systemic

May affect the whole body



Individual

Often differs from person to person



Variable

Ranges in intensity, frequency, and duration

4 Main Types

- External Impersonal
- Internal Personal
- Trauma Reliving Event
- Symptom Physical Effects

Conditions

- Dissociative disorders
- Cluster B personalities
- Depression & anxiety
- Trauma

Neurodivergent Triggers

Sensory Overload

- Neurological traffic jam
- Causes can be lights, sounds, patterns, textures, climate, etc.

Conditions

- Autism & ADHD
- GAD & PTSD
- Fibromyalgia & MS

Neurological Triggers

Brain & Nerves

- Internal causes include excitable brain cells & nerve damage
- External triggers similar to sensory overload

Conditions

- Epilepsy & seizures
- Migraines & neuralgia
- Autoimmune disorders
- Vestibular disorders

Content Note

Flags about sensitive topics that a user may find difficult or disturbing to engage with.

Trigger Warning

Specific statements identifying common triggers like flashing lights or discussion of traumatic materials

Trigger Warnings in Spaces

The Time

Presenters or event hosts provide verbal and written warnings during the activity

The Place

Warning signs before entering a place where people may encounter triggers

The Space as a Whole

Systems and processes in place to provide a high-level understanding of activities that may be triggering

Trigger Warnings in Physical Spaces

A-frame signs outside meeting spaces





Hybrid Spaces

- In higher ed, trigger warnings on syllabi and course materials have been controversial
- Many worry it reduces academic freedom, but just as many believe informed decisions are key to learning



Trigger Warnings in Digital Spaces

- Blurred overlay on sensitive images & videos
- Settings media to hide sensitive content or even mute words or phrases
- Explicit alert dialog before accessing sensitive material



The Obstacles

People weren't ready

- In-person services didn't translate easily from physical to virtual, including the "zones"
- Amid the crisis of the pandemic, large companies rushed and small companies fell behind



Technology wasn't ready

- Common video streaming tools don't have features like blurs for sensitive content
- The UX for virtual conferences was ill-defined – "Build the bridge when we get there"



More Reach = More Needs

- First opportunity for some people with sensitivities to attend these spaces
- New access needs had to be navigated in a new space



How We Change



Playbook

Reduce the severity of triggers, or avoid triggers altogether

Create (reasonable) barriers to prevent unintentional triggers

Warn early and often, as well as across multiple zones


Make sure all warnings are fully accessible or provide alternatives

Provide mechanisms to control or decrease sensory load



Reduce or Avoid Triggers


- Avoid triggering content if it isn't essential to the activity
- Reduce severity of content by removing certain graphic elements





Create Barriers to Triggers

- Remove auto-play or add a blur overlay on multimedia
- Add opt-out settings, alerts, or put triggering content within disclosures

Warn Early & Often

- Consider how you warn across the time, the place, and the space as a whole
- Provide features for people to pre-select or opt-out






Ensure Access to Warnings

Trigger warnings need to be for everyone.


Account for how disabled users navigate and interact with the web.





Decrease Sensory Load

- Captions, captions, captions
- Control background and external sources of audio
- Provide breaks between activities and async options



Further Down the Road

The Playbook will need to change.

This is OK – accessibility is a moving target.

Laws and Policies

We can't rely on kindness.

Accessibility laws and standards exist for a reason.



Innovation in Tech

Features like blur overlays, opt-out settings, and other forms of filtering will be the rule – not the exception.
